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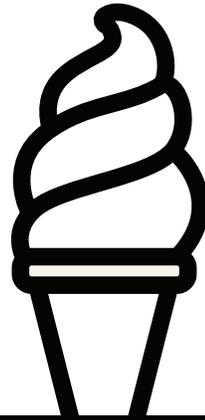

# PREPARING CANADIANS FOR A CHANGING WORLD OF WORK

The Canadian economy is strong, and has created one million new jobs since 2015 – pushing the unemployment rate to its lowest rate in 40 years. Our youth unemployment rate is currently at 10.3%, the lowest rate since records started being kept.

One of our first actions as a government was to cut the small businesses tax rate, helping keep money in the hands of small business owners so that they can invest and grow. To help our businesses grow and trade globally, no matter how big or small, our government has signed three trade agreements – CETA, CPTPP & CUSMA – with a focus on workers’ rights during the negotiations. As a result, Canada is now the only G7 country to have a trade agreement with all other G7 countries.

Nonetheless, even with a growing economy and good fiscal stability, our world of work is changing and precarious jobs with differing standards of skill-sets and experience are becoming more common.

To make sure that every Canadian has access to the skills and experience they need to thrive in our workforce, our government has implemented the Canada Training Benefit – giving every Canadian the chance to take four weeks off every four years for training courses, ensuring that Canadians continue to upgrade their skills so that they can access the jobs of today and tomorrow.
